Unfortunately the language of teaching is Hungarian. Students can request consultations in English, German or French. The Language Department organizes Hungarian courses free of charge.

Rules for regular students:

Regular students follow the normal admission procedure taking place between the last week in June and the first week in July. The following documents are required for application, to be submitted at the Registrar's Office by 1 March:

- * Professional curriculum vitae
- * Documentation of works (slides, photos, catalogues or video tapes)
- * Copy of certificate of highest educational level achieved

Having passed the entrance examination regular students attend the courses of the general curriculum. An MA university degree can be obtained after successful completion of studies comprising 10 semesters (5 years).

In Finland conservator studies are a 4-year programme on the polytechnic (polytechnics call themselves nowadays also universities of applied sciences) level.

You can study it at the EVTEK University of Applied Sciences and at the Seinäjoki University of Applied Sciences. In both places the language of instruction is Finnish. There are no tuition fees. At EVTEK University of Applied Sciences it has also been possible since 2006 to do a Master's degree in conservation, lasting 2 years.

Additionally, EVTEK offers also specialisation studies in conservation. This adult education is offered for professionals having polytechnic or equivalent degree in conservation. The one-year programme consists of 30 credit points. Adult education is organised during evenings and weekends.
